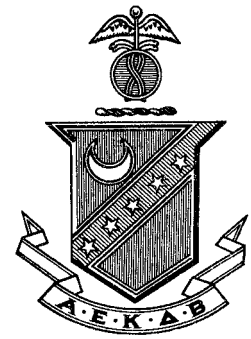

Fourth, and possibly most important, to enjoy Kappa Sigma fellowship with the Brothers of our Chapter.

## Tradition

One of Kappa Sigma's newest traditions — but one that has become so well established that it is almost taken for granted — is the tradition of having a representative of the youngest Chapter travel to the Installation of the next Chapter and present to it the symbol of infancy, a Baby Bottle. The Baby Bottle has travelled an amazing total of 35,537 miles (actually more, because the measurements were made of direct air distances), since November 1966, when Theta-Nu Chapter at Ashland College, Ashland, Ohio, made the first presentation of the Kappa Sigma Baby Bottle to Theta-Xi Chapter at Tri-State College, Angola, Indiana.

## Colonized Last Year

Our chapter was colonized and installed as a chapter last year. Previously, we had been a chapter of a National General Fraternity, Sigma Mu Sigma. The Lambda Chapter of Sigma Mu Sigma was formed at Elon College in 1952. Unfortunately, the chapter gradually became dissatisfied with the organization. This discontentment culminated in the Fall of 1972 when the chapter unanimously agreed to separate from Sigma Mu Sigma. Our long range plan was to join a larger and more effective national social fraternity. So we began.

There were five basic steps necessary to attain our goal. First, we obtained the college's permission and disassociated with Sigma Mu Sigma. Secondly, we petitioned the college faculty for a local charter, calling ourselves an arbitrary name, Lambda Kappa Fraternity. Thirdly, we interviewed several national social fraternities and unani- mously chose to petition Kappa Sigma for colony status. Our petition was accepted and our twenty-six members were colonized on February 7, 1973. Fourthly, we completed Phases One and Two of our colonization, which included ser-

vice projects for the school and community, and money-making projects for the charter fee. Fifthly, our forty-two members, alumni as well as undergraduates, were granted a charter and installed as a chapter on September 21, 1973. (Former alumni of our chapter who have not been initiated may do so before September 21, 1974, one year from our charter date).

No one regrets the effort that we have made and the work that we have done. We are very pleased with the national organization of the fraternity. One of our brothers has already received a \$250 scholarship from a national fraternity fund. Regular chapter activities continue to keep us busy. Every room in the chapter house has been remodelled in the last year. We have service projects, money-making projects, and of course, many social functions. Efforts are constantly being made to increase participation in chapter activities. We encourage alumni participation and look forward to a strong alumni chapter in our area. We are proud of our chapter and optimistic about its future.
